## Natural hazard and socio-political dynamics in Vietnam

How do historians establish and discuss interaction between environmental events - such as floods, drought, and other natural hazard - and social, economic and political history? To address this central issue in environmental history, this session will focus on the impacts of climate-related hazards to explain the political upheaval, dynastic changes and the social violence.

Mr. Vũ Đức Liêm will grasp the relationship between climate and history, natural and human systems through the interplay of environmental and socio-political factors between 1800 and 1850 in northern Vietnam. Increasing social violence under the Nguyen rule has generated much speculation and controversial theories. None of them, nevertheless, deliberately measured multifaceted environmental drivers and the impacts of natural disasters on the trajectory of Vietnamese history. Here we investigate historical records to reconstruct the climatic and ecological aspects of the social and political turmoil claimed by floods and epidemics in the Red River Delta. The aim is to demonstrate the constant interaction between humans and nature as part of history-making. Going beyond deterministic and reductionist arguments, this 'environmental hypothesis' illustrates the significance of climatic vicissitudes in major historical events by recognizing patterns of possible effects of past climate variability on Vietnamese history.
